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I. Introduction

Brandon University Senate approved the establishment of the Centre for Critical Studies of Rural Mental Health in May 2019. The Centre is in the Faculty of Health Studies with the Dean of Health Studies administratively and financially responsible. The Director of the Centre is Dr. Rachel Herron, the Canada Research Chair of Rural and Remote Mental Health. Co-managing the Centre with Dr. Herron is Tracy Young, the Research Facilitator for the Faculty of Health Studies.

MISSION/GOAL

MISSION: To produce high quality research on rural mental health through interdisciplinary and community partnerships while building a self-sustaining Centre.

GOAL: To accelerate academic research, knowledge mobilization, and community engagement initiatives related to rural and remote mental health and wellness.

The Centre welcomed Tracy Young into the position of Research Facilitator in September 2022. She brings a wealth of frontline healthcare experience, community connections and research experience. Tracy took over the Research Facilitator experience after Madeleine Kruth left to pursue Medical School at University of Alberta.

The LOGIC MODEL, attached, guides Centre activities and outlines criteria for evaluating success. The logic model has four components: Building Research Partnerships, Capacity Building/Infrastructure, Knowledge Mobilization, and Funding. The Logic Model also lists anticipated outcomes resulting from Centre activities.

A Warrior's Red Road: Connecting to Culture through Drum Making

Key Words: Indigenous men, ceremony, culture, brotherhood

Abstract: Due to continued colonization in Canada, Indigenous people lack opportunities to connect with cultural practices. Specifically, Indigenous men deal with negative stereotypes about their ability to fulfill social and cultural obligations. Indigenous men also deal with the added burden of lack of programming to address their specific needs as men and fathers, and intergenerational trauma. Despite decades of literature supporting Indigenous cultural programming as a means to increase and support wellness, difficulties obtaining consistent and sustainable funding lead to further program problems. Additionally, research on Indigenous men's programming rarely follows up with participants to understand the impact of programs over time. To address this, we engage with Indigenous and Spiritual leaders through community- based action research to deliver and evaluate land-based cultural practices by

hosting a program that helps connect Indigenous men to their inherent right of traditional hunting, harvesting, and drum making. The program followed Indigenous men through a traditional hunt, harvesting, creation of drums, awakening of the drums and numerous sharing circles for over a year. We aimed to improve cultural connection for men while building and evaluating traditional programming, and developing a method for the Indigenization of research that can further benefit Indigenous communities. Through sharing circles, individual interviews and photovoice, we determined two central resources required to run programs and five overall impacts. This presentation shares the men's voices and photographs to tell the program's story and the importance of this type of research. An Indigenous research assistant presents the findings from the research integrated with their own personal perspectives. We hope that by disseminating the findings of this research, local Indigenous organizations will be able to secure sustainable funding and resources to continue to support Indigenous men in healing and wellness through land-based learning. We also hope that the conversations led by the presenter continue discussions about conducting engaged research with Indigenous partners and community.

III. Capacity Building



- CCSRMH Annual General Meeting, April 1, 9-12: Over 30 members attended! Attendees learned about shared interests in rural mental health and recent research at the Centre. A key feature of the event was a brainstorming session focused on key issues and future collaborative actions.
- CCSRMH Student Lunch & Learn Event, April 11th, 12-1: Following the CCSRMH AGM students and student advocates came together to learn more about the Centre and to help identify how the Centre can further support student opportunities on Campus and within the realm of research.

Capacity Meetings & Partnership Opportunities

- Rachel and Tracy were invited to meet with Federal Minister Rural Economic Development, the Honorable Gudie Hutchings, for a rural healthcare roundtable discussion with other constituents, including Erika Stebbings from the Canadian Association for Rural and Remote Nursing (CARRN), Dr. Sarah Newbery from the Northern Ontario School of Medicine, Stan Marchuk from the Nurse Practitioner Association of Canada, and Dr. Kathleen Ross from the Canadian Medical Association. We were asked to comment on the pros and cons of remote service delivery, mental health care needs, and economic developments in support of rural healthcare.
- A second roundtable discussion was held on Feb 15th, with the Federal Minister of Rural Economic Development. This discussion was centered on provincial and rural response to the recent Federal announcement about the Canada Health Transfer top up. Rachel and Tracy followed up with local and provincial leaders to continue to advocate for rural mental health care needs.
- The CCSRMH sent a letter to local and provincial political representatives introducing the work of the CCSRMH, advocating for changes to support the rural healthcare workforce, and offering to collaborate on future initiatives. This brought about a request for a Tour of FHS Psychiatric Nursing program and a Centre Meet & Greet with the Honorable Janice Morley-Lecomte, Minister of Mental Health and Community Wellness, MB.
- The Centre for Critical Studies of Rural Mental Health secured a contract with Prairie Mountain Health to evaluate the accessibility, impact, delivery, and scalability of the mobile Rapid Access to Addictions Medicine services to rural communities. This research will inform the development and future expansion of rural addictions services in PMH, provide funding and training for three research assistants, and enable the centre to advance research in multiple priority areas.

• Two practicum students worked with the Westman Youth Wellness Hub (Huddle) to develop an evaluation tool to help the organization understand youth experiences of the wellness hub and make improvements to services.


